Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,


1 Kingdoms (1 Samuel) 27-29 tells us that when the Prophet anointed David King of Israel, David, not yet reigning, fled from his father-in-law and reigning king, Saul, and he hid within the camp of the Philistines and served them as a commander. But when the Philistines prepared for battle against Israel, they wisely choose to drive David out of their ranks, to prevent probable betrayal. The commander, after delivering this difficult message to David, gave him a great piece of advice: "do not keep an evil thought in your heart." (29:10)

Brothers and sisters, as we commence a new year, let's follow this good advice by confessing, forgiving, moving on, letting go, humbling ourselves, making excuses for others, covering sins of others, etc. - not keeping an evil thought in our hearts. # **Baked Kale Chips**





- Preheat an oven to 350° F. Line a noninsulated cookie sheet with parchment paper.
- With a knife or kitchen shears carefully remove the leaves from the thick stems and tear into bite-size pieces. Wash and thoroughly dry kale with a salad spinner. Drizzle kale with olive oil and sprinkle with seasoning salt.
- 3. Bake until the edges brown but are not burnt, 10 to 15 minutes.

# Ask Abouna

<u>Previous Question</u>: Father Boniface, how is the mission in Delaware doing?

Answer: Parishioners at the mission of Saint Andrew the Apostle in Lewes, DE, continue to express a great deal of appreciation to Saint Philip's in Souderton for sponsoring and nurturing our community over the past nine years.



The first Divine Liturgy was held in the evening on Dec. 4th, 2003, in the social hall of the Lutheran Church of Our Saviour, Rehoboth Beach. No rent was asked of us. Liturgy was held on a weekday evening once a month for about two years. After that, twice a month for another two years.

Next, the mission moved to the Grange Hall in Lewes for the Divine Liturgy twice a month on Sunday mornings. Upon after Father Boniface's retirement from Saint Philip's, March 1, 2009, he was assigned as the Pastor of Saint Andrew's and the Divine Liturgy was celebrated every Sunday at the Grange Hall, along with some Feast Days, Lenten Services, and Holy Week observances.

The weekend of Sept. 22-23rd, 2012, at the Saturday evening Vespers, the new building was blessed with Holy Water and the first Liturgy was held Sunday morning with over a hundred people attending. We reached that number again when His Grace, Bishop Thomas visited the weekend of Nov. 17-18th and the official "door opening" of the new Church took place.

Our Sunday School presented a beautiful Christmas Program on Dec. 23rd. Photos of the program and other parish news can be viewed on the Saint Andrew's website: www.orthodoxdelmar.org.

A tremendous amount of love and prayer and sacrifice has brought us this far. Our mission community has been blessed by many good people of faith and also by knowing that Saint Philip's has been positive about us and about all mission outreach.

The Lewes-Rehoboth area (the "Delaware Beaches") is not only a summer tourist destination, but an all-season destination for visitors. The town of Lewes connects with New Jersey by the Lewes-Cape May Ferry which makes several crossings each day.

Parishioners have collected foods for Thanksgiving and Christmas distribution and also responded in a big way after Hurricane Sandy, sending funds to the Archdiocese and collecting and delivering a huge amount of foods, paper goods, first aid supplies and needed items to a distribution center in Brooklyn.



We have welcomed many visitors to our services, individuals and families on vacation, newcomers to the area, second home owners and retirees. We welcome all coming to the "Beaches." Divine Liturgy is
