Baby Steps to Holiness

Are you tired of committing the same sins day after day? Our Lord tells us to "watch and pray lest you enter into temptation" (Matthew 25:41). But how is that done practically? It's simple ...

In the morning, after we say our prayers, we can spend a minute previewing, or thinking through, the day. For example, if a parishioner at their ice cream shop, I need to be ready with how I will graciously accept their hospitality and also keep the fast ... perhaps water ice or some soy ice cream.



Wisdom from the Optina Elders on Argumentativeness



Ask Abouna

Previous Question: Fr. James, tell us about vour trip to Russia.



NICHOLAS of our Archdiocese. We spent two weeks in Russia, eight nights in St. Petersburg and five in Moscow. While in St. Petersburg, we also took side trips to the ancient city of Novgorod and to the port city of St. Petersburg, Kronstadt.

Besides seeing the cultural sites of the country, we were blessed to visit many churches, cathedrals and monasteries. Most of these had been closed and desecrated under the Soviet regime (1920-1990). For example, the famous monastery of St. Alexander Nevsky in St. Petersburg had been turned into the city crematorium (cruelly ironic, since the Orthodox Church forbids cremation). This monastery has now been restored, and over a hundred monks now reside there. Similar stories abound--the famous Danielov Monastery, traditionally the residence of the Patriarch and the administrative center of the Russian Orthodox Church, was turned into a reform school for wayward youth.

Since the fall of Communism in 1990, there has been a nationwide restoration of churches, cathedrals and monasteries. The most well known is the rebuilding of Christ the Savior cathedral in Moscow. Built to commemorate the victory of Russia over Napoleon, it was torn down by Josef Stalin in 1930. During the 1990's it was rebuilt exactly as it had been before its destruction.

Many relics of saints were also recovered. Some, alas, had been scattered by the Bolsheviks, but some were put in cellars, garages or warehouses (some even in Museums of Atheism to show how primitive the Orthodox were by "worshipping" bones). St Tikhon (bishop in America and patriarch of Moscow) had had his body hidden under floor boards. The body, still in his vestments and coffin, were rediscovered when the Donskoy Monastery was revived and restored.

One of the most moving days involved our visit to Butovo, a site south of Moscow which served during the '30's and 40's as a killing field for the secret police. Over 21,000 people were executed here, including many churchmen. Of the more than 1,700 people declared to be "New Martyrs of Russia", 350 of them lie in the unmarked graves of Butovo.

If any of you have a chance to make such a pilgrimage to Russia, I would advise you to do it. You will not be disappointed!
