It is at least a 75-minute drive each way to confession, and very beautiful, especially with the autumn foliage reminding us of the beauty and wisdom of God's creation. Father Mark, as usual, greets us with a big smile and a warm blessing.

After my wife unburdens her soul, my children begin to file in and out, blissfully ignorant of the heaviness of life. (Unless we become like children, we shall by no means enter the Kingdom of Heaven!) It is my turn and I routinely run down my laundry list... "I did such and such." When my list is through, he asks, "How is your heart?"

"How is my heart?" That is quite a question. My heart is often annoyed and sometimes truly upset, such that I don't think clearly. Even in the midst of the greatest joys, the roar of anger is

Even if we don't project them, we set an emotional trap for ourselves whenever we think we are justified in expecting such and such. Of course, when your demands are not met, you get upset. Just drop them and everything will give you peace and you will give everyone else peace."

I am struggling to grow into these words and I share them with you so that you can, likewise, drop your demands and, therefore, inherit the "peace of God that passes all understanding."

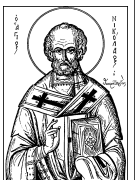

Ask Abouna

Previous Question: Fr. Noah, tell us about your trip to Mt. Athos.

Answer: Our pilgrimage was truly an awesome experience historically, relationally, and ecclesially.

First, it was like stepping into a church history book. I venerated the relics (skulls, large pieces of bones, entire caskets...) of many saints (especially St. Philip, Ss. Peter and Paul, St. John the Baptist, St. Andrew, St. Demetrios, St. Anesia, St. Haralampos, St. Ignatius of Antioch, St. Photeini) and prayed before some beautiful and ancient icons (Glykophiloussa, Hodigitria, Axion Estin). In Thessaloniki, I prayed in the prison and place of martyrdom of St. Demetrius beneath the massive church dedicated to him and also at the place where St. Paul preached (Acts 17).

Second, as one of the priestmonks, Geronda Macarius, said, "We don't travel to see places, but to meet people." Not only did I meet the saints in their icons and relics, I met some beautiful people living their lives at full throttle for God's glory. Many monks and pilgrims gave me a warm smile, a wise and loving word, or a sharp rebuke that, I guess, I needed. We traveled with the names of all our parishioners to meet our holy family on the other side of the world. Also, I was given the simple and magnificent advice to cultivate my heart for the sake of my family and my parish.

Finally, after about sixty church services in 10 days, in a foreign language, I realized that it is not necessary to travel at all. The Orthodox Church is one body, one family of saints "militant" and saints "triumphant." Our liturgy, as well as our ethos of obedience, self-sacrifice, trusting in God, praying ceaselessly, our love of scripture and saints, forge us into unity in Christ. I went to liturgies in massive cathedrals larger than a football field, in 1,000 year old churches, and tiny chapels, celebrated in Greek, French, Slavonic, and English, and I realized (though I already knew this) that we have everything in our parish of St. Philip. We are the "Catholic" (universal = like a 'stem cell' - each part has the entire 'DNA' of the church) Church and are members of Christ and of each other.

It was truly humbling and strengthening to encounter God in the tragedy and triumph of history - our living history - as well as in the personalities and spiritual dynamism of our church. Sweet Potato Black Bean Chili

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| 2 small onions, diced | 2 cups chopped kale |
| 3 cloves garlic, minced | 1 cup sweet peppers, diced |
| 1-1/2 tbsp chili powder | 2 15-ounce cans black beans |
| 1-1/2 tsp cumin | 1 24-ounce can diced tomatoes or equal amount of fresh diced tomatoes |
| 1 tsp oregano | 1 cup vegetable broth |
| 1 tsp smoked paprika | salt and pepper |
| 1/2 tsp crushed red pepper | |
| 3-4 cups sweet potatoes, scrubbed clean and diced. Leave the skin on. | |

In a large, heavy-bottomed pot, sauté onion and garlic with a sprinkle of salt over medium-high heat for a couple minutes until onion begins to soften. Mix in spices and cook for another minute. Add potato, kale and peppers and a splash of the broth and stir well. Cover and cook for ~5 minutes until veggies begin to soften. Add tomatoes, beans and broth, stir well and bring to a boil. Reduce heat, cover and simmer for 20-25 minutes, stirring occasionally. Salt and pepper to taste.
