Baby Steps to Biblical Literacy: Old Testament – Genesis

Can you open your Bible and understand the passage? Do you know where to turn to find the great heroes of our faith? Can you explain “Salvation History” from Creation to Christ’s Incarnation? Where to you turn for encouragement & direction? During this church year let’s journey together to understand more broadly the wonderful work of reconciliation that God has been doing since the beginning. As you read, ask me, Fr. James, or Dn. Herman questions to help you understand.

In September, read Genesis. Read with attention to the people and the big ideas, not just Adam and Eve. Pay special attention to Abraham’s call (Genesis 12:3: *And in you all the families of the earth shall be blessed.*) and the history of Patriarchs.

These are foundational and an exciting part of our holy history. Ask yourself the WHO, WHAT, WHERE, WHEN, WHY & HOW of Adam & Eve, Cain & Abel, Noah, Abraham & Sarah, Lot, Melchizedek, Hagar & Ishmael, Isaac & Rachel, Esau, Jacob & Rachel, Joseph & his brothers.



- +Everything you do in revenge against a brother who has harmed you will come back to your mind at the time of prayer.
- +Prayer is the seed of gentleness and the absence of anger.
- +Prayer is a remedy against grief and depression.
- +Go, sell all that belongs to you and give it to the poor, and taking up the cross, deny yourself; in this way you will be able to pray without distraction.
- +Whatever you have endured out of love of wisdom will bear fruit for you at the time of prayer.
- +If you want to pray properly, do not let yourself be upset or you will run in vain.
- +Do not always want everything to turn out as you think it should, but rather as God pleases; then you will be undisturbed and thankful in your prayer.

Previous Question: Father, how can I forgive so-and-so?

Answer: Many people struggle with forgiveness. They know that they “should” forgive. They “want” to forgive. They try to forgive. But, their hearts are still constricted by resentment, bitterness, hurt. So, how do we move forward? I have two simple suggestions.

Repent!!!

I came across a beautiful word recently that deepened the way I understand this.



“Forgiveness is born out of the soil of repentance.” This came from a podcast that I’ve since lost track of. It doesn’t mean that we are “at fault.” It means, perhaps, in our being too self-focused we cannot see and embrace God’s providence in this matter. Repentance means to “change the mind/heart.” We must change our hearts by doing the right thing, confessing to God personally and in the Sacrament our weakness and inability to forgive. Also, when we examine our hearts and repent of the wickedness lurking therein we become more understanding of others’ faults.

Imitate our Lord!

As Jesus was hanging on the Cross, he said, “Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do.” As hard as it is, we need to assume the best intentions in them. This will allow us to write off their hurtful behavior as proceeding from their own human limitations.

Beg God for the grace of repentance and for strength to follow our Lord’s example. We can do all things through Christ who strengthens us!
