WRITE A LIST OF PEOPLE TO PRAY FOR DAILY

I was in seminary with a wonderful old deacon, Triva, from Serbia. Struggling to keep up with everything, I asked this godly man to pray for me. He smiled broadly, hugged me, and then whipped out a piece of paper and a pen from his breast pocket and wrote down my name. I noticed that there were many other names on there, as well. What a beautiful and faithful friend and brother in Christ! We can all be like that too. I have a typed list of the names of each of my family, my parishioners, and my friends and colleagues that I endeavor to pray for every day. When I get a prayer request, I scribble it on an index card and pray for it daily. I've been taught to say my morning prayers (Trisagion, Creed, etc.) and then read quickly and unemotionally the names of those I am praying for and then say my prayer rule of the Jesus Prayer for myself and for them. So make your list, keep it in your prayer corner and keep an index card with you so you can faithfully pray for those for whom you ought. Among the first... Metropolitan Joseph, Bishop Thomas, Fr. 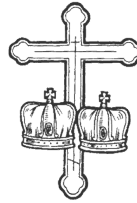
A MARRIAGE BLESSING

Previous Question: Why are we having another festival?

Answer: First of all we are having a festival because we have something to feast about. We are throwing this party in thanksgiving for God's mercy to us in Christ and His Holy Orthodox Church. We are rejoicing because He has trampled down death by death and has forged a new people, the Church!

The **goals of the festival** are four: 1) Reach out to the community. 2) Build up our community. 3) Raise money for local charities. 4) Support some non-budgetary needs of our parish.

I am reminded of my pilgrimage to Mt Athos. Each monastery has its Panegyri (its festival) in which monks from all over the Holy Mountain come together to pray, refresh, and support each other. Likewise, while I was traveling through Thessaloniki, I was there right before the feast of St. Demetrius the Myrrhstreamer. The church, which is as magnificent as it is old, is a magnet for people all over the city, the country, and all over the Orthodox world. The parishioners were busy greeting, cleaning, giving away materials, giving tours, singing, preparing refreshments. They were working hard to share the blessing of God with anyone who came.

Our festival is similar. It is not about the money. It is about bringing people to see the church, to “taste and see that the Lord is good,” in a non-threatening way.

May it be blessed for God's glory, for the building up of the church, and for our salvation!
