A Message from Fr Noah

Dear Saint Philip's Family,

Our western world is moving away from tradition, normalcy, and Christianity. This is seen in the number of "nones" (to be distinguished from "nuns") – people who have indicated "none" as their religious affiliation. They are found in our neighborhoods, our workplaces and, sadly, even in our families. Let me share a little conventional wisdom as to why people move away from God, and then what we can do about it.

- Hurt they can't get over a personal tragedy and can't believe in a God who would allow or cause it. "How could a loving, all-powerful God do/allow suchand-such?"
- Scandalized they can't get past the hypocrisy and scandal of Christians and clergy. "Too many people do bad things in God's name."
- 3) Proud they just really believe that human knowledge has ruled out God, despite many gaps in theories, evidence, and logic. "Religion is an old myth to answer the questions of previous generations."
- 4) Run-Away seeking pleasure, success, and fulfillment they have emancipated themselves from the rules and expectations of Holy Scripture. "I am free to do what I want."

How do we, as Orthodox Christians, respond?

- Prayer. Deep, consistent, liturgical, prayer for God to save us and the person in mind.
- Tears. We should be broken hearted. If we don't have tears for hell-bound souls, pray for tears.
- Love. Lots of listening, not a lot of talking, but not being afraid to speak up for the truth when necessary.

Sometimes I think that "all is lost" in the battle for the culture, but that is a demonic whisper. No. All is not lost. God has not abandoned us. We ourselves, our family, our parish, can repent and then become bearers of God and channels of Grace for the hurt, shocked, proud, and run-away in our lives.
