Wisdom from St Basil the Great



Homily on the Beginning of Proverbs §§16-17 on Prov 1:5

"All of us who travel the path of the gospel are merchants, being in the business of acquiring heavenly goods through the profits we earn by keeping the commandments ... We must put our goods on board, and try to pass through this life safely ... So then, hold the rudder of your life steady. Steer your eye, lest a fierce wave of desire ever crash upon you through your eyes. Steer your ear, your tongue, lest you hear something harmful, lest you utter something forbidden. Do not let the storm of anger capsize you. Do not let the buffets of fear overwhelm you. Do not let the burden of sadness sink you. The passions are our waves. If you raise yourself above them, you will be a trusty steersman of your life. But if you do not steer clear of each of these waves with skill and steadfastness, then like a ship without ballast tossed about by their constant assaults you will be lost in the sea of sin. ... It is the custom of sailors to gaze up at the sky in order to receive guidance [from the sun or constellations] for their voyage ... As for you, direct your eye to heaven ... Look upon the Sun of Justice. Guided by the commandments of the Lord as if by bright stars, keep your eye sleepless ... so that the commandments may guide you forever more."

Dear Saint Philip's Family,

Did the Great Fast start without you? If so, it isn't too late to jump onto the path toward Pascha!

We certainly know from life generally that any destination worth reaching requires walking a particular path to get there. The Holy Fathers and Christ himself have given us the path that we must walk, that of increased prayer, fasting, and almsgiving, of increased participation in the Church's holy services. This is the way of preparation given to us so that we may participate in, be incorporated into, Christ's victory over death!

Let's remember that the food part of the fast is the lowest – foundational and indispensable – level of fasting. We fast from entertainment, distractions, decisions (as able), screens, vacations, and various other luxuries so that we have more time to focus on God's love and share it with those around us.

Please, take this time seriously. Don't let the lenten tailwind pass over you and leave you in the middle of the stormy sea of life! Put up the sails of your soul and be driven by God's Spirit into the calm harbor of the Resurrection!

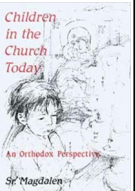

Previous Question:

Fr. Noah, how was your pilgrimage to Mount Athos?

Answer:

Εὐλογεῖτε! (Greek for, “bless!” - the standard Athonite greeting - of love, respect, and humility before another Christian)

As they say, “a picture is worth a thousand words”. But words are not enough to capture the blessings, the struggle, and joys of a pilgrimage anywhere, let alone the Holy Mountain. We stayed at 5 monasteries and visited about 10 more, both on Mt Athos and on the mainland. I'll limit myself to a few highlights:

I travelled with exceptional people. While we had the inevitable interpersonal challenges, it was truly humbling and inspiring to be with the priests and laymen I traveled with. A little snoring did not drown out the blessing of brotherly affection, mutual support, and in-depth discussions.

The landscape of northern Greece and the virgin lands of the Garden of the Panagia were truly refreshing and ascendant. It was like going back in history, seeing monastery after monastery, skete after skete, kelli after kelli, punctuate such fiercely beautiful land.

The holy relics and miraculous icons abound beyond imagination, deepening faith and appreciation for the fact that God is wondrous in His Saints.

The highlight, though, of course, are the living saints that we met and the wisdom and love that they imparted to us. We spent hours and hours in deep conversation with men and also women (we visited several convents off Athos - indeed, the nuns rivaled the monks in manliness!) who shared from their uncompromising pursuit of God's love in prayer and ministry, in poverty and obedience.
