

## Ministry Together w/ Dn. David Hyatt

"He is not yet a faithful servant who bases himself on bare knowledge alone; a faithful servant is he who professes his faith by obedience to Christ, Who gave the commandments."

St. Mark the Ascetic

We live in an information age, an era where data is readily available at a speed and convenience that was heretofore unimaginable. But information alone does not make us any wiser than our ancestors, and because of the ease of access to data we might very well be more foolish than those who learned through experience. Perhaps we are like the man who admitted, "There are many things that I know, but few that I apply." How dreadful it is to be an educated fool, but even more dreadful to be a theologically astute rebel.

If we are to enter into union with the Holy Trinity, we must learn obedience to Christ's commands. Jesus said, "If anyone loves Me, he will keep My word; and My Father will love him, and We will come to him and make Our home with him" (John 14:23). How do we know if we love Christ? How do we grow in union with the Holy Trinity? By learning obedience to Christ's commands, not simply learning Christ's commands.

Many of us who converted to the Orthodox Church did so after reading a variety of books and listening to hours of podcasts and homilies. This was an important step on our journey, but information alone does not make us Orthodox. Likewise, many of us who were born into Orthodox families have learned throughout our lives about the traditions and teachings of the Church, but that knowledge alone does not make us Orthodox either. Both are helpful and beautiful paths on our journey, but applying the mind and the way of life of the Orthodox Church through a lifetime of repentance - empowered by the grace of the Holy Spirit administered through the Holy Mysteries – is what forms our lives in loving obedience to Christ's commands.


St. Paul writes, "We know that we all have knowledge. Knowledge puffs up, but love edifies. And if anyone thinks that he knows anything, he knows nothing yet as he ought to know. But if anyone loves God, this one is known by Him" (1 Cor 8:1-3). While earthly knowledge of theology or tradition puffs up, genuine knowledge of God – and being known by God – leads to a life of humility! It is to the humble that God pours out His grace (1 Pet 5:5), and it is the humble who work out their

salvation by following the example of Christ Jesus (Phil 2:5-13).

St. John Climacus, in *The Ladder of Divine Ascent*, writes, "Obedience is the burial place of the will and the resurrection of lowliness." In our willfulness we resist obedience not only to the commands of Christ, but also to those whom God has given us for our salvation, but when we put to death our prideful will, humility rises in us, bringing new life and the knowledge of God.

May we be men and women who not only know about God but know God and are known by Him. May we daily walk the path of repentance that leads our lives step by step into union with God. May we learn obedience to the commands of Christ, the only way of true life and freedom in this life and the next! So that, as St. Benedict of Nursia writes, "As we progress in this way of life and in faith, we shall run on the path of God's commandments, our hearts overflowing with the inexpressible delight of love."



His Eminence also referred to Sunday's epistle reading in which St. I Paul talks about preaching the gospel "and not with eloquent wisdom lest the Cross of Christ be emptied of its power" (I Cor. 1:10-17). "Inundated by media from many sources with words of philosophy, opinion, and rhetoric, we see that the false eloquence of the world does not bring us to salvation or to any understanding of what God wants from us," Sayidna said. "Quite the opposite. It dangerously sends us into separation from Him - and from one another - by insisting on our own sensibilities, interpretations, and understandings. God has made foolish the wisdom of this world 'for since, in the wisdom of God, the world through wisdom did not know God" (I Cor. 1:21-
