



St. Philip Cemetery Notes



<u>Headstones and Grave</u> <u>Markers at St. Philip Cemetery</u>

The rules and regulations for headstones and grave markers at St. Philip Cemetery were originally developed by the Cemetery Committee when the Cemetery was opened.

Headstones and flat markers (stone or metal) are allowed in Founder's Field and the simple burial area in the northern section of the cemetery. Only flat markers are allowed in the Memory Garden and Mercy Field. Temporary wooden markers may be used but permanent headstones or markers should be placed within six months of a burial.

No headstones or markers may exceed 48 inches in height. The maximum headstone size for a single grave is 48 inches wide, 48 inches high, and depth as required for stability. Maximum headstone size for a double grave for a husband and wife is 72 inches wide (base), 48 inches high and 24 inches deep (base). A minimum 4inch-thick form must be used for the base of a headstone and done by contractor that has been approved by Cemetery Committee. designs should be submitted to the Parish Priest for review to ensure there are no problems.

No mausoleums or statuary are permitted in the cemetery. No non-orthodox symbols, fraternal or secular symbols are allowed on markers. A cross is always an acceptable symbol to put on a marker.

No planting of perennial plants, trees or bushes on plots is allowed. Annual plants are permitted during the summer months but must be removed by end of growing season. Plastic plants are discouraged. No fencing, coping, enclosure, iron, wirework, bench, or anything that hinders trimming up to the headstone, are allowed on plots.

Periodic checks of the cemetery will be made by the Cemetery Maintenance team to remove any noncompliant items that will interfere with routine maintenance (mowing/ trimming) of the cemetery.

Care and maintenance of markers are sole responsibility of plot owner or family of the deceased. The Cemetery Committee and St. Philip Church are not responsible for any damage to headstones or markers.

St. Nicholas Garden Project

"And the Lord God planted a garden in Eden, in the east; and there he put the man whom he had formed."

We are in the midst of the creation of a garden behind the St. Nicholas House, with the hopes that it will yield a glorious Headstone harvest. Thus far, the area has been staked and the ground has been dug up. It is roughly a 25' x 60' area. There will be a through the midpoints of the sides. This will divide the plot into four quadrants. A tentative work day has been scheduled for April 10th, where we will spread mushroom compost over the area, till it in, and prepare beds. After this, we hope to build a fence around the perimeter that will keep out critters, big and small. Irrigation is another concern that we would hope to have rectified in the coming weeks. Upon completing these tasks, we would be prepared for planting. This is very much a community garden, so suggestions and contributions encouraged! It would be a good idea to start indoor seedlings now so that they might be ready for planting time.

PART 2: A Note to Young Believers

There will always be bullies. Sometimes we meet them on the playground; other times we meet them in the classrooms of our life, both literally and figuratively.

Bullies try to separate us from what we know to be true by intimidation, shame, and fear—fear of not being accepted, of not being "cool," of being "on the wrong side" of an issue. And our world is full of cultural and intellectual bullies who use their "expertise" or supposedly superior intellect or "moral vision" as a club to beat people into submission.

We must know, as Christians, that we are not part of this game, that we do not play the "game of life" according to those rules. God is our Coach and Referee; it is to Him that we look, and Him that we

seek to please.

So, do not be afraid of or shamed by the "science"-filled culture of our day which demands physical explanations for everything around us, that tries to pit God and reason/science against one another. Science does not cancel God. It points to God. It does not compete with God. Rightly understood, science is gift of God to mankind so that we may uncover and explain the order in the universe as a revelation of God's loving care and provision for us.
